

Justice Reinvestment: A New Correctional Strategy for New Jersey

A lecture by Todd Clear, Dean of School of Criminal Justice, Rutgers-Newark



Todd Clear assumed the deanship of the Rutgers School of Criminal Justice in March, 2010. He is a distinguished criminal justice scholar who formerly taught at Rutgers and John Jay College of Criminal Justice. He has written extensively on community justice and is currently involved in studies of the geography of correctional policy, religion/spirituality and crime, and the economics of justice reinvestment. He has authored 12 books, including his most recent, *Imprisoning Communities: How Mass Incarceration Makes Disadvantaged Neighborhoods Worse* (Oxford University Press, 2007). Clear is founding editor of the journal *Criminology and Public Policy*.

Discussant **Roland Anglin** is Faculty Fellow and Director of the Initiative for Regional and Community Transformation (IRCT) at Rutgers' Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy. Professor Anglin's most recent research interests have focused on studying innovations in the field of local and community economic development. He is currently working on an evaluation of youth crime prevention strategies for the State of New Jersey.
