The graduate forum is designed to encourage scholarly exchange and feedback on your work in a casual and supportive environment. Graduate panelists will give a brief 5-7 minute presentation of their work. Formal papers are not required for participation. We especially encourage submissions highlighting developed original research and dissertation projects.

This forum will also feature an hour-long panel dedicated to professional development where scholars will discuss their experiences and insights on turning your dissertation into a book, writing proposals and applying for grants, and exploring non-academic job markets. A question and answer session will follow the panel. Lunch will be served.

Submissions should include:

1. Your name, email address, department, campus, and year in school
2. Title of your presentation
3. 150-200 word description of your presentation and argument
4. Brief (1-2 sentences) biography
